Angelica Central School is one of twelve high schools in Allegany County having classes in Driver Education and Safety Training. Schools taking part in the training on a full day basis are Alfred, Almond, Boulden, Cuba, Fillmore and Wellsville and those on a half day basis include Angelica, Andover, Canaseraga, Richburg, Rushford, Scio and Whitesville. Allentown, Belfast, Belmont and Friendship are not participating.
Two dual controlled cars have been obtained without cost through the courtesy of the Lester Chevrolet Wellsville. These are dove gray and will have the words "A.A.A. Dual Control Driver Training Car" under which will be a dealer court-essy line. Boards of Education of the twelve schools are sponsoring the program in cooperation with the Allegany County Vocational Board. 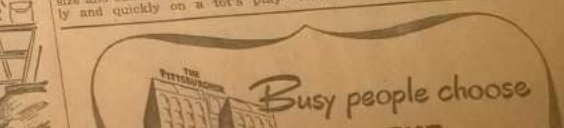
Musical Therapy For Children

A month-long experimental program of musical therapy for children and adult cases at a mental hospital in New York has been announced by the New York Local 509 of the American Federation of Musicians.

The department of agriculture says: "Many substances have been applied to cattle to keep away heel flies and to kill the grubs deposited on the legs of the animals. All have been found to be either ineffective or impractical. The best time for attacking the pest is when the grubs are in the backs of cattle."

Keep an inventory of the soil's fertility, the same as of buildings, livestock and equipment, advises Middle West Soil Improvement committee.

Nearly any farmer knows how many dairy cows, beef cattle, hogs and sheep he has. He also keeps a record of his seed, feed, buildings, machinery and fences.

Few farmers, however, have an inventory of their principal asset—the soil. Yet a farmer's earning power depends largely on whether his soil's fertility level is high or low.



On thousands of farms a soil fertility inventory would show serious shortages. Overcropping has used up nitrogen, phosphorus and potash. The organic matter supply is scraping the bottom of the barrel. Soil structure has been damaged. Drainage is poor and air circulation is shut off. Crop output is low.

Restocking the "shelves" of the soil warehouse involves several essential steps. Plant food is important. But other things also are needed, particularly organic matter and good soil structure. The soil inventory can be improved faster and at lower cost if "leaks" are halted by conservation measures that will slow down runoff and save topsoil and plant foods. Among such measures are contour cultivation, strip cropping and terracing where needed.

Hay fever can also lead to infection of the sinuses, throat and bronchial tubes and, in some cases, accompanied by asthma.

Hay fever is an allergy, or sensitivity, to pollen, dust or other substances which affects the eyes and nasal passages.

The allergy known as perennial hay fever, which can strike at any time of the year, is sensitivity to house dust, animal hair, feathers or certain foods. Seasonal hay fever is caused by certain pollen in the air during the season when the grains which cause it is in bloom. It occurs in certain areas, or perennial, during April, May and early June. Summer hay fever, varying with the arrival of pollen from such grasses as timothy and redtop, starts at the end of May and continues until the middle of July.

The most widespread type of hay fever is caused by ragweed pollen. Known as fall hay fever, it lasts from about the middle of August to the time of the first frost in the fall. Hay fever is serious enough to call for medical treatment. The victim should consult his family doctor for relief. The doctor may prescribe treatment or he may send the patient to an allergy specialist.

By a series of allergy tests, the doctor may discover what substance is causing the hay fever and then prescribe specific remedies that may partially or completely cure the sufferer's sensitivity. There are vaccines that prevent or make milder certain types of hay fever, and the doctor may recommend a series of injections with one of them during the months before the hay fever season begins. Injections during the attack may also bring relief. Removing pollen from the air, particularly in the sufferer's sleeping room is another form of treatment. For this the doctor may advise an air filter, perhaps in an air-conditioning unit, or an electric pollen remover. Or he may suggest a filter mask or small filter which can be worn in the nose. The boards will use the questionnaires to determine whether a registrant should be called for induction or deferred. The questionnaires will go out in the order of birth dates—with the oldest first. Beginning September 20, the boards are to start mailing questionnaires to other registrants in the same fashion. Thereafter, the questionnaires will be mailed to each registrant as soon as he reaches the age of 19. Registration begins next Monday, August 30.

Mr. Truman also directed that classification of draft registrants shall be no discrimination because of race, creed or color or because of membership or activity in any organization. All men 18 through 25 must register for the peacetime draft. Those 18 through 25 are subject to call for 21 months' service unless deferred. The 18-year-olds may volunteer for a year's training and thus escape being drafted later. As provided by the law, Mr. Truman ordered deferment of most veterans and of conscientious objectors. Any veteran who served 90 days or more in the armed services during World War II will be

But the reaction was not appreciated. He was received in North Carolina by hostile audiences who showered him with invective, with rotten eggs and tomatoes.

His speeches were blighted not by hate and cynicism in Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan, Connecticut and Charlotte. N. C. Wallace was stoned with whatever was happening to him.

In Burlington, where the hall here of North Carolina's vengeful mood was unbroken, the former vice president was not even given a chance to talk. He was unable to do anything except dodge missiles and plead with the furious audience closest to him that things like this were not supposed to happen in the United States.

It was an ugly display of hatred that spread hysterically from man to man as Wallace's hour neared. The egg and tomato campaign was severely criticized by U. S. officials, including President Truman who called it "highly un-American business," and said: "Wallace is entitled to say the same as any other

GREEK CRISIS

Relieved

The C. S. group of administration officials who were at the meeting in Washington, D. C., on Tuesday, Sept. 22, were relieved to learn that the Greek crisis had been settled.

At least since the announcement of a Greek election, however, seemed to be a long time in the making. The Greek aid program, which was not with a report that the aid was being withheld, had been a constant danger of Greece's withdrawal from the Communists.

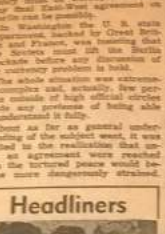

Add all at once to flour mixture, stirring, not beating, quickly and vigorously until just mixed but still lumpy in appearance so that muffins will have good texture. Fill greased or oiled muffin pans, one-half full, and bake in a hot (425-degree) oven about 25 minutes.

***WHOLE WHEAT MUFFINS:**
Use above recipe, reducing flour to one-quarter cup, adding one cup

A SIMPLE DISH like macaroni and cheese has several good variations that you can use frequently. Here, again, when you learn how to make the dish to perfection, you can be certain to enjoy the food no matter what variation you use.

Macaroni and Cheese
(Serves 6)

- 1 1/2 pound package macaroni
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1/2 cup flour
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 cups milk
- 1 1/4 cups grated American cheese

Cook macaroni in boiling salted water until tender. Melt butter in top of double boiler, blend in flour and seasonings, then add milk and cook until thick. Add grated cheese and stir until melted. Combine sauce and macaroni and turn into a greased casserole. Bake in a moderately hot (400-degree) oven until golden brown, about 20 minutes.



HAM AND MACARONI: Place one-third package macaroni in casserole, top with thin slices of leftover ham, sprinkle with a little dry mustard, dot with butter and pour some of sauce on top of that. Repeat with layer of cheese, ham and sauce twice. Bake as above.

MACARONI WITH MEAT: Use basic recipe, with one cup sliced tongue, chicken or corned beef in layers.

***BAKED TOMATO MACARONI:** Arrange three skinned, thinly sliced tomatoes in layers with macaroni and cheese sauce in casserole.

(Makes about 14)
2 cups sifted flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons granulated sugar
1 egg, well beaten
1 cup milk
4 tablespoons melted shortening or salad oil

Set together dry ingredients. Combine all remaining ingredients. NUT MUFFINS: Use plain muffin recipe, adding one cup finely chopped nuts to other ingredients.

ORANGE MUFFINS: Use plain muffins, increasing sugar to four tablespoons, reducing milk to three-quarter cup, and adding one-quarter cup orange juice and one-quarter cup grated orange rind.

CHEESE MUFFINS: Add one cup grated American cheese, lightly packed, to dry ingredients.

BLUEBERRY MUFFINS: Mix three-quarter cup of fresh blue-

Coarsely grated potatoes may be mixed with chopped onion and hamburger, skillet fried, to give you meat and potatoes all in one quick-to-fix dish.

Beef or calves' liver dipped in french dressing and bread crumbs is pan fried for just a few minutes to get done. Add some canned sweet potatoes heated in a dusting of brown sugar and butter in a skillet for the accompaniment.

WORK STARTED ON N. Y. STATE FREEDOM TRAIN

Work began Tuesday on assembling a special, six-car New York "Freedom Train," which will tour the state for a year.

The train will contain some 100 historic state documents tracing the growth of religious, political and individual freedom within New York.

The train's exhibits will be shown in each community in the state with a population of 35,000 and will be primarily for school children. However, adults also will be urged to view the collection.

The Legislature early this year appropriated \$50,000 to pay expenses of the "Freedom Train" tour. The train is being assembled in Albany shops of the New York Central.

The exhibits are sponsored by the New York State Society of Newspaper Editors, the New York State Newspaper Publishers Association, New York Press Association and New York Associated Dailies.

William H. MacKenzie Appointed Elector For 45th District

William H. MacKenzie, Belmont, New York state assemblyman, has been appointed one of 47 presidential electors for New York state.

Appointments were announced by the state Republican committee, at Albany. Assemblyman MacKenzie will represent the 45th congressional district.

The committee, in making the appointments, hoped that the electors would give Governor Thomas E. Dewey his largest block of votes after the November election.

The electors will cast their ballots for Governor Dewey if the Republicans carry New York state election day.

Disabled Vets Given Additional Allotments For Dependents

Veterans of 45 years since the Spanish-American war and peacetime vets for the same period who have 60 per cent or more disability will receive additional compensation for dependents effective September 1st, according to an announcement by the regional office of the Veterans Administration at Buffalo.

Veterans of the Spanish-American War, the Philippine Insurrection, the Boxer Rebellion, World War I and II will receive the increase when they establish dependency for a wife, children or parents. These former service men may get allotments for their immediate family in addition to compensation for dependent parents.

Eligible veterans are not to apply to the VA offices in the Ellicott Sq. for the new benefits. Forms will be mailed to the veterans from the list of eligibles on file.
