## Our Annual Audit

Of late, the town board's efforts to audit properly the accounts of public officials has taken on a definite improvement over past efforts to comply with Section 105 of the Town Law. This is partially due to the progressive program of the Bureau of Municipal Affairs in the Department of Audit and Control and their systematic auditing of all towns over a period of two years.

The annual accounting meeting must by law be held on or after December 28th but not later than December 31st of each year. The town clerk's duties at this meeting are, as usual, to keep a record for the minutes of everything filed and the action of the town board on each official's account. He, like other town officials, should file a statement showing receipts and disbursements of all moneys handled by him during the past year, and produce his records for audit which should consist of his copies of the Dog, Hunting and Fishing and Marriage License reports to the State Departments, together with his monthly statements to the supervisor, showing the transactions of his office.

In the average towns of our State, the above information will show the complete story of the town clerk's fees that have already been turned in to the supervisor. In the larger towns, additional information and records should be furnished due to the issuing of permits and licenses because of town ordinances.

A town clerk, under Section 142 of the County Law, must receive a statement from the county treasurer on or before December 28th, showing all payments to the supervisor during the year. This statement must be used by the town board to audit properly the supervisor's accounts.

By law, the town clerk has no part in the audit of any official's accounts, as this is entirely the duty of the town board. However, there are many ways in which the town clerk can assist his town board during this meeting. By previous arrangement, the procedure of the meeting can be planned and the statements and records furnished by the town officials can be

arranged so that an orderly routine will be followed. Each town official should be present during the audit of his accounts so that any questions arising may be quickly answered. If procedure is arranged in advance, much time will be saved for each town official as you can very nearly plan what time each account will receive the attention of the town board. In most towns this has now become an all day meeting, and in many towns, a two-day session.

Every town official should read Section 105 of the Town Law prior to the annual meeting, that he may fully understand the obligation that rests with his town board. They have a big job. We should all cooperate in this most important meeting of the year for all town boards.

## New Town Officers

Regular town elections have been held this year throughout the State of New York, except in Broome County. Many new public officials have been chosen for various town offices.

Your attention is directed to Section 25 of the Town Law—Oaths of Office and Undertaking—and should be called to each elected or appointed person's attention before he begins the duties of his office.

Every town officer shall take and file the oath of office required by law before he shall be entitled to enter upon the discharge of any of his official duties. This must be done within fifteen days after the commencement of the term of office for which he is chosen.

Each supervisor, town clerk, collector, receiver of taxes and assessments, justice of the peace, constable, town superintendent of highways, and such other officers and employees as the town board may require, before entering upon the duties of his office, shall execute and file an official undertaking, conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties, in such form, in such sum and with such sureties as the town board shall direct and approve and such approval shall be indicated upon such undertaking.

### Agricultural Chattel Mortgages

Numerous inquiries have been received in relation to the effect of Chapter 878 of the Laws of 1945 (the so-called Anderson Act) on the fees of chattel mortgages.

Chapter 878 of the Laws of 1945 amended Chapter 659 of the Laws of 1934, which as the town clerks undoubtedly know, relates to chattel mortgages given by persons, associations, partnerships and corporations engaged in the business of farming, crop production or the raising, breeding or marketing of livestock to a production credit association organized under the farm credit act of nineteen hundred thirty-three, a regional agricultural credit corporation, a federal intermediate credit bank, or any institution which has made arrangements to discount therewith, or to procure funds therefrom on the security of the obligations of the borrower, the reconstruction finance corporation, or the government of the United States or any department, agency or officer thereof. These are commonly known as Federal Farm Loan chattel mortgages and Chapter 659 of the Laws of 1934 established a filing fee of twenty-five cents for such mortgages and a discharge fee of ten cents. (This is discussed in detail in an opinion published in the September 1944 issue of *Town Clerks Topics*.)

The Anderson Act of this year now adds the new language "and any person, association, partnership or corporation" to the original law, making the provisions thereof apply to any agricultural or farm chattel mortgage, rather than one offered by a federal agency.

Therefore, any agricultural chattel mortgage, whether it is offered by a federal farm loan agency or

by any bank, individual, corporation, etc., must be filed for twenty-five cents, and the discharge fee on any agricultural chattel mortgage is similarly ten cents. The only matter for the town clerk now to determine is "Is it an agricultural chattel mortgage" rather than "Is it a federal farm loan?"

### Replies from Department of Audit and Control

You inquire whether or not a county clerk must charge a fee to record a certificate of honorable discharge of any veteran.

There is no fee for such recording in any county of the State of New York.

Section 161-a of the County Law provides as follows:

§ 161-a. Recording certificates of honorable discharge. Any certificate issued after April sixth, nineteen hundred seventeen, or hereafter issued, of the honorable discharge of any veteran, and a certificate of honorable discharge of an exempt volunteer fireman, or a certificate issued to an exempt volunteer fireman under the provisions of section two hundred two of the general municipal law, may be recorded in any county, in the office of the county clerk, and when so recorded shall constitute notice to all public officials of the facts set forth therein. *It shall be the duty of the county clerk to record any such certificate, upon presentation thereof without the payment of any fee.* This section also applies to the counties within the city of New York. For any purpose for which such original honorable discharge or such exempt volunteer fireman's certificate may be required in the state of New York, a certified copy of such record shall be deemed sufficient and shall be accepted in lieu thereof. (\* \* Portion relates to counties within New York City only. \* \*) The term 'veteran' means a person, male or female, who has served in the armed forces of the United States, or in any branch of the armed forces of the United States during the time of war, and has been honorably discharged from such service or furloughed to the reserve."

Both the oath of office and the official undertaking shall be filed in the office of the county clerk of the county in which the town is situated.

Following is the last paragraph of Section 25, which has very sharp teeth:

"A neglect or an omission to take and file such oath, or a neglect to take and file within the time required by law such undertaking, when required, except in the case of justices of the peace, shall be deemed a refusal to serve and the office may be filled as in case of vacancy. The undertaking of a town officer provided by this section shall be in addition to any undertaking otherwise required by law."

## ITEMS FOR THE LOCAL HISTORIAN

## The Local Historian's Job

What is the Local Historian? He is a local government official who is appointed in accordance with the state law. His duties, as stated in the law, are to collect and preserve material that relates to the history of his area. This work supplements that of the town clerk, but does not conflict with his work, for the Local Historian is primarily concerned with the unofficial records of his community. He is responsible for collecting the non-official records—family papers, printed material, maps, pictures and any other pieces that may have an historical use and value. Actually, this collecting is only a small part of the Historian's work, but it is the vital part.

Official records are already preserved by the town clerk and other officials. The Local Historian's field is the non-official records which are, perhaps, more voluminous, more scattered, and more difficult to define. They are the records that were kept by anyone, and often were not intended for permanent preservation or public use, but they have acquired an added value with the passing of time—they are now historical documents.

Those records of the past are not too difficult to evaluate, but it requires foresight to select from the present day material those pieces that will be useful in the future. The Local Historian must make the selection from this array of contemporary material. For example, a file of telephone directories will act as a set of directories of the community. Such ephemeral material is designed for temporary use only, then to be disposed of as casually as one throws away yesterday's newspaper. Catalogs of local business houses, programs of the county fair, and broadsides of local announcements are other examples of this material that are read or used for the moment and then discarded before their historical value is appreciated. In most communities that had a newspaper one hundred years ago, it is impossible to find a file for the earliest years—although hundreds of copies were printed—because no one had the responsibility of saving it.

Records of today are probably more generally being saved than formerly because the future need and uses for the records is better understood. The saving of war records is a case in point—although even here an educational campaign was necessary to impress the need for saving the records before it would be too late. But an individual is still necessary to search for those records to ensure their collection and preservation.

Private papers of the past are usually found among the old families of the area. There they have been handed down for generations, some carefully preserved by their owners and others stored in attics, closets, or other out of the way places. But as long as they remain in private hands, their future safety is in doubt. In a private home there can be no guarantee against loss by fire, unintentional disposal during a housecleaning, destruction by a disinterested person, or any of the other hazards that always threaten. Their greatest safety comes when they have reached the Local Historian's office.

Some of these families are glad to give their family papers to the Historian for preservation, others will give some of their papers. Regarding the latter, one of the most successful of the County Historians said that he replies, "What I really want are the papers that you are keeping. I have a great respect for your knowledge of these papers and I know that you have sorted them very carefully. The papers that I really want are not the papers that you are willing to give away, but the papers that you want to keep." Surprisingly often, he reports, the donor sees this point and includes the more valuable papers in his gift.

Other family papers that cannot be obtained should be noted so that another attempt can be made at a more propitious time, and so that their locations will be known for possible future use. The permission to copy can usually be obtained and a transcription or photographic prints made of the more important papers.

Second hand book dealers and antique shops often acquire family papers that can be purchased if funds are available. Antique dealers, especially, obtain this material when they buy the entire content of old houses to get the furniture, and they are usually glad to sell the papers and books at very reasonable prices. These are valuable contacts for the Local Historian to make and maintain.

The entire problem of the Local Historian in collecting records will vary from town to town depending on: the age of the community, whether urban or rural, the migration of the older families, whether there were previous collectors of records, and other factors. But under the best of circumstances, there is more work to be done than he has time for. His job is big, he is entirely responsible for the collection of the vast field of scattered, unofficial records, with no authority to enforce his requests, and few precepts to guide him. He is on his own, aided by his keenness for the search, and the prestige he has brought to his office by his work.

## Records Obligations of Local Government Officers

Records are living documents. They contain the information necessary to make the wheels of government go round. If they are lost or misplaced or badly organized, local government cannot function efficiently. If, on the other hand, no distinction is made between those records which must be used daily, those which are referred to only occasionally, and those which after a time may be regarded as of practically no value, and if all of these records are kept together without discriminating between them there results confusion and inefficiency in government. The problem, then is at least three-fold:

The first is to provide satisfactory protective housing for the records which must be kept permanently and which must be used frequently.

The second is to provide satisfactory housing for the records which are used less frequently but which have to be kept for varying periods of time.

The third problem is to dispose of or otherwise destroy those records for which there is no further use.

The Division of Archives and History of the State Department of Education has the obligation of helping to carry all three of these purposes into effect. The head of the Division is the State Historian under whom serves a Supervisor of Public Records whose duty it is to keep closely in touch with local government offices throughout the State; to advise local government officers; and in general, to see that the local records are satisfactorily preserved.

Within the last few years, it has become more and more apparent that the volume of records in local offices has increased at a much faster rate than we could have anticipated ten years ago. It is also obvious that the present facilities for housing these records are on the whole inadequate. As a consequence of this situation,

we have come to certain conclusions, based upon the results of surveys which have been made in recent months.

The most important of these surveys was made in the summer of 1945 when Mr. Hermann Robinton, the Supervisor of Public Records, spent three months in Onondaga County. During that time he went over the records in every local public office in the county. This survey revealed what had long been suspected that many of the records which should have been in local offices were not there and that many of the records which should have been destroyed were not destroyed. The results have been that town clerks and others have been hampered in their work because they have had too many unimportant as well as too few essential records. What is true in Onondaga County is true generally throughout the State.

If any person comes into a local office and asks a question which he has a legitimate right to ask and for which he has a right to expect an answer, and if the answer cannot be found because the records are not there or because they are not well organized, then to that extent the public is not well served. The basic starting point, therefore, of any records program is to have available the records that are necessary for carrying on the public business.

There are two general types of records. The first are those which have to be kept in a local office because they are used very frequently. The Regulations of the Commissioner of Education and of the Board of Regents require that these shall be kept in fire proof safes or vaults. Lists of what shall be kept in such places have been sent to all town clerks as well as to village clerks.

Those records which are of less importance and less frequently used than this first group should be kept in a convenient place where they are adequately protected against dampness, mice, fire and the like.

The Division of Archives and History is very much concerned about the housing of records in local government offices. The Division's policy is to retain the

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### And More About Records —

(From the article "Public Records Must Be Protected," American City, September, 1946.)

How valuable are public records? What should be done to protect these records against fire or other loss? Unfortunately these questions become acute in all too many cases only after a fire or flood has brought destruction.

Every thinking person is more or less conscious of the value of records and of the desirability of protecting them from destruction. Few, however, know how to protect records, especially from fire. This is not to say that records are lost only through the medium of fire. Records are sometimes destroyed by water, vermin, and neglect. But, if records are adequately protected from fire, they will in a large measure be protected from the other destructive influences mentioned, except flood waters.

After 23 years of work, the Committee on the Protection of Records of the National Fire Protection Association reported to the annual NFPA meeting in June of this year that the greatest handicap in the protection of records from fire is the lack of appreciation by the average custodian of the irreparable loss that results from the destruction of records.

Scattered throughout the land, and indifferently protected, are the public records of birth, marriage, and death; deeds of conveyance and trust, testaments, court decrees, and a wealth of written evidence on which proof of citizenship, legal status, rights and ownership depends. Their loss may mean expensive litigation and deprivation of rights and property that have required a lifetime of effort and sacrifice.

A burned building can be replaced, even though there has been a real loss of wealth. But if a record of which there is no copy extant is burned, it is gone forever. Therefore, records call for absolute preservation.

The science of protecting records from the effects of fire may be said to have begun about 1910 when Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc., conducted the first test in which the temperatures of the furnaces and of the air inside the record container under test were recorded. Adoption of a temperature rise limit has served to place the rating of record containers upon a quantitative basis and suggested the temperature rise method of rating walls and partitions.

While it is hardly probable that the best in fire resistance has been achieved, there is no crying need for further technical improvement at this time. The manufacturers of record protection equipment have done their part. More important now is better understanding on the part of record custodians in estimating the protection needed and providing the protection which the situation demands.

### Recent Opinions of State Departments

#### TOWN CLERK'S OFFICE HOURS

You inquired whether this Department could advise you as to the hours during which a town clerk is required to be on duty.

We are aware of no provision of law regulating the hours during which the town clerk's office must be kept open. However, since the town clerk is the custodian of the public records of the town, it would appear that the clerk's office should be open to the public at reasonable hours, so as to permit access to such records. The clerk should also be available at reasonable times for the performance of his other duties, as, for example, the issuance of licenses of various kinds.

In our opinion, the town clerk should be on duty a sufficient number of hours to enable him or her to adequately and efficiently serve the public. Such hours would be determined by the amount of business normally done by the clerk. (7/9/46.)

*Notaries Public—Duty of County Clerks to Assign Official Numbers:* Under the 1946 amendment, county clerks are required to assign official numbers to all notaries public whose commissions or certificates of appointment are on file on and after September 1, 1946, the effective date of the amendment. (Executive Law, Secs. 100-105, as added by Chapter 844, Laws of 1946; 8/15/46; Informal.)

## State Aid for Joint Operated Recreation Projects

OPINION BY THE DEPARTMENT OF AUDIT AND CONTROL

May a recreation project of a town or village receive state aid through the New York State Youth Commission pursuant to Chapter 556 of the Laws of 1945 if it is operated jointly by the town or village and a school district?

Who would be liable for injuries caused by the negligent acts of the persons employed in the operation of the project?

It is our understanding that the school district has funds that may be made available for this purpose and that it is willing to undertake the operation of the project.

### STATEMENT OF LAW

*Inquiry 1.* Chapter 556 of the Laws of 1945 provides that the New York State Youth Commission may approve the granting of state aid to recreation projects "owned, maintained or operated by or under the direction of a municipality, devoted in whole or in part to the provision of leisure-time activities for youth." The term "municipality," as used in such chapter, is defined to mean "a county, city, village, town or that part of a town not included within the boundaries of a village."

Section 95 of the General Municipal Law, as added by Chapter 557 of the Laws of 1945, reads as follows:

"§ 95. *Youth Agencies and Assistance.* Any municipal corporation is hereby authorized and empowered to establish, maintain and operate a bureau or agency thereof for the purpose of coordinating and supplementing the activities of public and private agencies devoted in whole or in part to the welfare and protection of youth therein, and to undertake and promote activities and establish, maintain and operate projects devoted in whole or in part to providing leisure-time activities for youth or assistance to children. Any municipal corporation may appropriate, raise and expend moneys for the purposes of establishing, maintaining and operating such bureau or such agency, and may also receive and expend moneys from the state, the federal government or private individuals, corporations or associations for such purposes."

Article 13 of the General Municipal Law also empowers certain municipal corporations, including towns and villages, (General Municipal Law, Section 240) to establish, equip, operate and maintain playgrounds and neighborhood recreation centers.

Section 242 of such law reads as follows:

"§ 242. *Administration, Equipment and Operation.* The authority to establish and maintain playgrounds and neighborhood recreation centers may be vested in the school board, park board, or other existing body or in a recreation commission as the board of estimate and apportionment, common council, board of aldermen or

corresponding legislative body, or the governing board of any such county, town or village, shall determine. The local authorities of any such municipality designated to equip, operate and maintain playgrounds and neighborhood recreation centers as authorized by this article, may equip such playgrounds and recreation centers, and the buildings thereon, and may construct, maintain and operate in connection therewith public baths and swimming pools. Such local authorities may, for the purposes of carrying out the object of such playgrounds or recreation centers, employ play leaders, playground directors, supervisors, recreation secretary, superintendent or such other officers or employees as they deem proper."

Section 244-b of such law reads as follows:

"§ 244-b. *Joint Playground or Neighborhood Recreation Centers.* Any two or more such municipalities may jointly acquire property for and operate and maintain playgrounds or neighborhood recreation centers. Any school board or district shall have power to join with any such municipality in equipping, operating and maintaining playgrounds and neighborhood recreation centers and may appropriate money therefor."

Section 244-c of such law, in part, provides that the governing body of a town or village:

"\* \* \* may, and on the petition signed and acknowledged by qualified electors of such municipality in number of votes cast for governor at the last gubernatorial election in such municipality shall, submit to the electors at a general election held in such municipality a proposition for the establishment and maintenance of a recreation system, if there be no recreation system therein, or for the maintenance of an existing recreation system in such municipality. The proposition shall specify the minimum amount which shall be annually levied and appropriated for maintenance of a recreation system in such municipality, which shall not exceed an amount equal to two mills upon every dollar of the assessed valuation of real and personal property in such municipality on the last preceding assessment-roll. \* \* \*"

It should be noted that the procedure of Section 244-c is permissive unless a petition is filed, in which case it is mandatory.

Section 246 of such law reads as follows:

§ 246. *Annual Appropriation.* The local authorities of a municipality having power to appropriate money therein may annually appropriate and cause to be raised by taxation in such municipality a sum sufficient to carry out the provisions of this article."

It is the opinion of this office that if a town or village playground or neighborhood recreation project:

(1) Is established pursuant to Article 13 of the General Municipal Law;

frequently used records in the town clerks' and village clerks' offices, that is, in local offices. Those records which are not frequently used and not properly housed but which should be kept for varying periods of time should be housed in quarters especially provided for them. In case such quarters are not provided for by the towns or villages, the Division is urging that counties build or provide rooms at the county seat where these records from the towns and villages can be housed in what we call county archives or county depositories.

In addition to these kinds of records, there are private papers and miscellaneous correspondence, maps, newspapers and books which are extremely useful and which must be consulted frequently in carrying on the public business. It is largely the responsibility of the local historians to preserve these materials. They should also take a hand in helping to preserve public papers which would otherwise be lost. Local historians should at all times, not only be in a position to help, but should be willing to help gather the records, secure information and answer questions which town clerks or village clerks ask or need to have answered. This is one of the reasons why the Division of Archives and History is urging all subdivisions to appoint local historians as soon as possible.

Housing the materials gathered by local historians presents a problem. According to the Education Law, local historians are required to collect and preserve historical materials of many kinds which they are required to deposit in public offices. It is intended that there should be preserved those documents, papers and materials which will be of use in local public administration. At the present time, the collections of local historians are kept in town clerks' and village clerks' offices, sometimes in the houses of local historians themselves, sometimes in the rooms of historical societies, and sometimes in local public libraries. It is right that arrangements should be made locally, but it is important that whatever the arrangements, they should provide for continuity in the development of the collections, so that they will not be shifted around from place to place.

The Education Law includes a crucial regulation which provides for the disposal of useless records. It specifies that no public record shall be destroyed except by permission of the Commissioner of Education. Its purposes are first, to prevent throwing away documents which may be of great historical importance or which are essential for carrying on the work of local

offices, and second, to protect the town clerks and village clerks against attacks for political or other reasons on the ground that they have thrown out records which should have been kept. The great difficulty of determining what should be thrown away and what should be kept should not fall upon town clerks or village clerks. The responsibility for making such decisions should be taken by someone else.

If satisfactory decisions are to be made it will be necessary to establish a complete list of the types of records which are created in local offices and it will be necessary to establish as uniform names as possible for these different types.

The entire program toward which the Division of Archives and History is working is one which will make it possible for local government officers to do their work more effectively, to serve the public even better than now. It is a program which retains in the individual community the greatest possible freedom to initiate and to carry on the public business of the community itself.

## State Aid for Joint Operated Recreation Projects

(2) Is equipped, operated and maintained with the participation of a school district pursuant to Sections 242 and 244-b of the General Municipal Law; and

(3) Receives support from appropriations by a school district pursuant to such Section 244-b; such project may be established without compliance with the provisions of Section 220 of the Town Law and is eligible for state aid pursuant to Chapter 556 of the Laws of 1945 upon application of the town or village. (*Long Island Lighting Co. v. Village of New Hyde Park* (1936) 247 App. Div. 728, aff'd 272 N. Y. 429.)

*Inquiry 2.* As to the question of whether the town or village and/or the school district would be liable for the negligent acts of persons employed in the operation of the project, it is suggested that if a project is jointly operated, liability insurance be purchased to cover both the town or village and the school district.

## CONCLUSIONS

A recreation project of a town or village may receive state aid through the New York State Youth Commission if it is operated jointly by the town or village and a school district pursuant to Article 13 of the General Municipal Law.

In the event of joint operation, liability insurance should cover both the town or village and the school district.

To The Allegany County Board of Supervisors  
Belmont, New York

Fifty years ago in 1895, Allegany County celebrated the Centennial of its first white settlement made in 1795. Next year being the 150th Anniversary of such settlement it is opportune to contemplate the beginning of civilized life here, and to discuss the observance of a Sesqui-Centennial.

Half a century ago the story of this region's first hundred years was much emphasized through the county, and the year was devoted in many ways to recalling the past, appraising the present, and preparing for the future. Something of this nature should be profitably undertaken for 1945.

Because of the War and our natural desire for complete absorption in it, we have not, until very recently, called attention to next year's local historic possibilities. But with present war prospects, (and the middle of next year being eight eventful months away, there ought to be some observance of the Sesqui-Centennial, the character and extent of which would depend upon the progress of the War.

Considerable interest and much good may attend the proper celebration of such a local history anniversary. Just pride would be encouraged in village and county and a knowledge of their history, now being so well emphasized in the curriculum of our public schools, would be further recognized as a necessary beginning for a better understanding and a keener love for the American way of life.

During such a period of local history observance as next year's 150th anniversary, social and fraternal organizations of all kinds, clubs, churches and schools could well take part recalling town and county history, reviewing their own interesting past and giving thought to their present aims.

Meetings for special addresses, pageants, plays, movies, minor addresses, information, quizzes, folk-lore presentations, exhibitions of local history materials, maps, pictures, old newspapers and relics could be a part of such an observance, and every town should and will have its part.

It was chance that gives the county's great anniversary date to Wellsville. John S. Minard's 1895 Centennial Memorial History of Allegany County, the County History of 1879, and previous Gazetteers and Directories, record Nathaniel Dike, a soldier of the Revolution as the first settler coming into what is now Wellsville in 1795, but other settlers among them, Reverend Andrew Gray, who held the first recorded Christian service in Allegany County, settled in Almond in 1796 less than a year later than Dike, and so did the gallant Major Moses Van Campen, Henry McHenry and Joseph A. Rathbun, who is reported to have acquired the first legal title to land in Allegany County. There were other very early settlers in Andover, Alfred, Angelica, Independence, Cascades and other towns.

Not only the early settlers in each town of the county should attract Sesqui-Centennial attention but the prominent men and families all down through the years and the high-spots of Township occurrences.
