STATISTICS FROM THE 1993 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT HISTORIANS OF NEW YORK STATE

In 1993 the network of Local Government Historians consists of sixty-two county and borough historians, sixty-one city historians, 938 town historians, and 566 village historians; 1,627 jurisdictions in all. In addition, thirty-four jurisdictions have appointed assistant, deputy, or co-historians. One jurisdiction - Greene County - has named a Minority County Historian. Thus at full strength, 1,661 local historians are obligated to report annually to the State Historian of New York. At present 137 jurisdictions - 11.9% of the total - are vacant. Twenty-three jurisdictions have named an historical agency to discharge the duties of the local historian.

In 1993 we initiated a new system by distributing an annual report form which we encouraged all local government historians to use in filing their annual reports. Some 678 historians returned the new form - or 47% of the occupied historians positions. An additional 182 historians filed annual reports using the old free-form style. Regrettably their activities could not be tabulated with the others. Nevertheless, a total of 860 local government historians - 60% of the occupied historians positions - filed reports for 1993 with the State Historians Office of the New York State Museum. This is a very encouraging figure and we are grateful to every historian who took the time to complete the new form.

We are still struggling to create a permanent mailing list of official government addresses for our historians. Thus questions one, two, and three allowed us to check and update the information on our mailing list.

Question Five asked the date of the historian's original appointment and the number of years of service. Twenty-one individuals declined to answer this question. Of those who did respond 184 or 27% were appointed during the 1990s and thus have less than four years of service. Some 277 historians or 41% of the total were first appointed in the 1980s and thus have from six to fifteen years experience. Note that 68% of the historians responding have fifteen years experience or less. An additional 134 historians or 20% of the total were appointed during the 1970s and thus have from sixteen to twenty-five years experience. Fifty more historians date their first appointment back to the 1960s and so can count on from twenty-six to thirty-five years in office while ten others, appointed in the 1950s have from thirty-six to forty-two years in office. Two individuals date their appointments from the blackest year of World war II, 1942, and thus hold the longevity record at fifty-two years.

Question Six asked whether the historian was born in the jurisdiction he or she represents. Two people declined to answer. Of those who did, 262 were native to their jurisdictions while nearly twice as many, 414, where born elsewhere and moved to their

jurisdictions later.

Question Seven inquired into the historians highest level of formal education. Fourteen people declined to answer this question. Of those who did, nearly half - 314 or 47% - have a high school diploma. 133 or 20% completed their undergraduate baccalaureate degree. A few more - 141 or 21% - hold their masters degree and twenty-four or 03% hold a Ph.D. or a doctorate in education. An additional fifty-two individuals claimed other kinds of formal education.

Of those with a baccalaureate twenty-one identified themselves as history majors. Twenty-two of the 141 historians with masters degrees identified themselves as history majors and four of the twenty-four historians with Ph.D. or D.Ed. degrees identified themselves as history majors. Thus forty-nine or 07% have formal professional training in history.

Question Eight asked whether the historian is employed or retired from a full-time position other than that of local government historian. The great majority - 492 or 74% - answered "yes." 168 or 25% hold no other job but that of local government historian. Eighteen or 01% declined to answer the question.

Question Nine related to the salary of local government historians. To this question 255 or 37% stated that they received no personal compensation for their service as a local government historian. Of those who do receive a salary the highest figure given was \$50,600.00 and the next highest was \$34,532.00. Averaged out, if you include those who receive no compensation, the average salary of those responding to the questionnaire is \$936.18. Discounting the 255 who are essentially volunteers brings the average salary for a local government historian in 1993 up to \$1,500.55.

Question Ten asked whether the historian received any employment benefits such as a pension or retirement plan, medical insurance or paid leave included in salary. Sixteen people declined to answer the question. Of those who did only sixty-nine or 10% stated that they were provided with employment benefits by their communities. A whopping 593 or the remaining 90% receive no employment benefits whatsoever.

Question Eleven asked what was the total operating budget for the historians office in 1993. To this question 260 or 38% gave a figure of zero for their total operating budget. Of those who do have an operating budget to run their offices the highest figure given was \$91,000.00 and the next highest figure was \$63,778.00. Averaged out, if you include those who receive no operating funds, the average operating budget of those responding to the questionnaire is \$1,335.41. Discounting the 260 who essentially fund their offices out of their own salaries or pockets brings the average operating budget for the office of a local government historian in 1993 up to \$2,166.04.

Question Twelve inquired into various in-kind resources provided or not provided by communities to their historians. If you assume that a blank equals a no answer the numbers come out as follows:

Office Space:	237 or 34%	This means that 441 or 65% of the historians responding to this questionnaire do business out of their home.
Mail Box:	230 or 33%	This in spite of our repeated requests that historians obtain at least a mail drop at their municipal facility.
Telephone:	161 or 23%	This means that 76 historians have offices with no telephones.
Postage:	359 or 52%	This means that 319 or 47% of the historians responding to this questionnaire have to buy their own stamps!
Stationary:	327 or 48%	This means that 351 or 52% of the historians responding to this questionnaire have to buy their own envelopes!
Copy Machine:	412 or 60%	
Computer:	77 or 11%	A depressingly low figure for this essential tool.
Clerical Help:	78 or 11%	
Travel Funds:	216 or 31%	

To Question Thirteen eighty-four historians, or 15% of those responding, stated that they prepared an annual budget for their appointing authorities and included a copy with their report. A staggering 543 or 85% of those responding stated that they did not prepare an annual budget. Fifty-one individuals declined to answer this question. Thus the preparation of budget requests stands out as an essential training requirement.

Question Fourteen related to the number of hours per week devoted to the business of being a local government historian. Only twenty-six individuals or 03% of those responding reported serving a full-time forty hours a week or more. An additional twenty-seven or another 03% spend an almost full-time thirty to thirty-nine hour per week on the job. Ninety-nine persons or 14% reported spending twenty to twenty-nine hours, still a considerable time commitment. 195 historians or 28% spend ten to nineteen hours per week as historian while by far the largest number - 292 or 43% - are part-time historians spending ten hours or less on the job. Thirty-five individuals declined to answer the question and five others reported working by appointment or on no set schedule.

Question Fifteen related to the historians's staff, either paid, volunteer, or student intern. Seventy-eight historians, or 11%, reported having either paid or volunteer staff while 188 or 27% reported using the services of student interns in 1993. Unfortunately I am

unable to compute the cumulative hours of contributed service donated to historian's offices by interns and volunteers but we can assume that the total is substantial.

Question Eighteen related to the kinds of publications produced by local government historians in 1993. 196 historians or 28% reported researching and writing one or more newspaper articles in 1993. Ninety-three historians or 13% reported producing one or more pamphlets or brochures in 1993. Twenty-two historians or 03% reported publishing one or more magazine articles in 1993. Twenty-one historians or another 03% reported researching and writing one or more scholarly articles in 1993 while thirty-eight historians or 05% reported publishing a book in 1993 and an additional forty-two, or 06%, reported producing some other type of publication in 1993.

The cumulative figures for question eighteen indicate that the local government historians of New York State who responded to our questionnaire researched and wrote some 2,102 newspaper and fifty-three magazine articles about the history of their communities; they researched, wrote, and published 2,074 historical pamphlets or brochures for distribution in their communities. Local government historians researched and wrote sixty-two scholarly articles for journals and they published forty-six books in 1993. Finally, local government historians produced forty-seven newsletters, ten radio editorials, ten radio vignettes, and one play, a total of some 4,405 historical publications.

Finally Question Twenty inquired into the kinds of public programming organized by local government historians in 1993. 275 historians or 40% of the total responding reported presenting one or more lectures or slide talks. 163 historians or 24% reported organizing one or more walking or automobile tours in their communities. 139 historians or 20% working on oral or audio/visual history projects in 1993. 245 historians or 36% reported making one or more presentations to school groups while 169 or 24% reported involvement in preservation activities in their communities in 1993. Thirty-four historians or 05% organized or hosted film or video series while ninety-five or 14% managed historic marker programs in 1993. Finally 174 historians or fully 25% of those reporting in 1993 reported involvement in some other kind of public programming.

The cumulative figures on programming reveals the breath of the historical activities of local government historians. In 1993 local government historians delivered 1,397 lectures or slide talks on the history of their communities. They organized and led some 660 walking and automobile tours of their communities; conducted 770+ oral and audio/visual history interviews; made 1,001+ historical presentations to school groups; engaged in 408 individual historic preservation projects; organized 57 individual film presentations or film series and one photographic show, and placed 193 historic markers in their communities.

Last year we initiated a new system by distributing an annual report form with questions that would permit us to quantify some of the wide variety of work local government historians do. Some 678 historians - 47% of the filled historian positions - returned the new form in time to have their work counted. A few more forms were received after the data entry was completed. An additional 182 historians filed annual reports using the old free-form style. Regrettably, their activities could not be tabulated with the others. Nevertheless, a total of 860 local government historians - 60% of the occupied historian positions - filed reports for 1993 with the State Historian's Office. This is a very encouraging figure and I am grateful to every historian who took the time to complete their annual report. I am especially grateful to those who elected to use the new form.

Enclosed, along with the 1994 report forms, please find the statistical summary that was compiled from your 1993 annual reports. Advance copies were made available at the fall AMHNYS and CHANYS meetings. Please take a few moments to read the report if you have not already done so. I think you will find the cumulative statistics interesting for the light they shed on New York State's local government historians and their work.

Because of the success of the 1993 report, we have decided to continue the pre-printed forms for this year. Once again, the form has been prepared in consultation with your representatives. We hope that you will find it convenient to use and that it helps you reflect on and evaluate your work of the last year. By taking a few moments to complete the Annual Report for 1994 you will help us to assemble a computerized data base that will provide important statistical information about you, your colleagues, and your work.

If you hold more than one post as historian (e.g. village and town historian), please send in a form for each jurisdiction that you serve. As we gather more detailed information about the wide variety of your activities and achievements, we will be able to share that information with you, with your professional organizations, with your appointing authorities, and with the Board of Regents and the State Legislature.

Enclosed are two copies of our Annual Report Form for 1994. Use one as a work sheet and keep it in your own official files. We encourage you to also provide copies of your report to your county historian and to your appointing authority as well. Please type or print your responses legibly, and return the second copy to:

I have come across a clipping dated "1900" stating that Sarah M. wife of Solomon H. Tracy, died at her home residence in Angelica on the 16th ult, aged 70 years. She was married to Mr. Tracy Sept. 30th 1852. She was the daughter of W. G. and Lydia Hoppough of Canadice. She had two brothers-Halsey Hoppough of Angelica and William Hoppough of St. Louis. This clipping apparently came from a scrap book that has been donated to the Historical Society at Canadice/Honeoye as they sent it to me.

I would be interested in anything that you have on this family, or the family of Halsey Hoppough. Is there a will for either, cemetery records, an obituary for either one, etc. Anything you have on either one would be appreciated.

Dear Ms. Hoppough:

I have started researching your family as you requested, and have come across a few items of interest. I still need to do some research at the county court house, so I will be in touch with you again.

After researching two books, *The History of Allegany County and Allegany County and Its People*, I came up with the following:

"Solomon H. Tracy, a native of Canandaigua, was born in 1829. When he was ten years old, he came with his father to Belmont. He married in 1852, in Canandaigua. In 1854 he removed to Angelica, where he is engaged in farming and stock breeding."

"Seth H. Tracy was born August 19, 1835 at Canandaigua. In 1840 his father Ira moved to Belmont where Seth attended school. He completed his education at Alfred Academy in spring of 1860 then read law with Col. A.J. McNett at Belmont. In May, 1863, he was admitted to the bar at Albany, 1865 he started a law practice in Belmont."

I have a feeling that each boy's middle name, "H" stands for Hoppough. In keeping their mother's maiden name, Hoppough within the family.

I did find more information on the boy's father and grandfather:

"Ira Tracy, was born in Pennsylvania in 1795. Solomon Tracy, his father, a native of Connecticut, was among the early settlers of Angelica."

"The village of Angelica was incorporated May 2, 1835, with these boundaries: Beginning at a stake in the southwest corner of William Neilson's lot, thence north 21 degrees, 19 chains and 20 links, to a stake in John Lloyd's field; thence south 6 degrees west, 50 chains and 82 links, crossing West Street to a stake in John Robson's field, thence south 68 degrees east on the line of John Magee's and Solomon Tracy's land, 71 chains and 15

links, to a stake in the corner of Tracy's lot; thence north 21 degrees east, crossing East Street 31 chains and 30 links, to the place of beginning."

One last item I found was the following on Sarah M.'s husband Solomon H. Tracy:

"Belmont Union E.A.U. was organized May 8, 1880 by L.J. Parker, Rep. Supreme President with 14 charter members...Solomon H. Tracy was Vice President."

Unfortunately, I did not come across Sarah M's name or either of her brothers, Halsey and William. I will certainly look for death records at the court house. As for Sarah's marriage record, that will be in Canandaigua, New York.

You stated that the clipping you had on Sarah M.'s death said she, "died at her home residence in Angelica on the 16th ult, aged 70 years." Please excuse my ignorance, but what does "ult" indicate?

In the meantime, I will so further research on the Hoppough's. I have enclosed addresses of the Canandaigua Historian and the Belmont Historian. They may be able to help you. I have also included a map to help you locate the mentioned towns.

I do hope I have helped you. I will be in touch soon. Good Luck!!

Dean Jennifer:

Thank you so much for the information you sent along. If I read your letter right I have the following information.

- I. Solomon Tracy from Connecticut, came to Angelica (c) 1835. His land is called out in the description of the Original Village Incorporation May 2, 1835. He had a son:
 - a. Ira was born in Pennsylvania in 1795. In 1840 he moved from Canadaigua, N.Y. to Belmont. He had son/sons:
 - 1. Solomon H. Tracy was born in 1829 in Canadaigua In 1840 he lived in Belmont, N.Y. He married Sept. 30, 1852 Sarah M. Hoppough (daughter of Westbrook & Lydia Hoppough). He moved to Angelica in 1854.
 - 2. Seth H. Tracy born in Canadaigua, N.Y. August 19, 1935. Seth became a lawyer and in 1865 practiced in Belmont.

I believe the "H" was in the family before the "Hoppough" arrived.

Our distant cousin Peggy Hoppough Treble is Historian for Honeoye, N.Y. Canadice, N.Y. is where the Hoppough family lived from 1820 on. John Hopkins is the Historian for Canadice.

Recently Peggy received for the Town Museum a "scrap book". One of the pages was full of a lot of little news items (not regular obituaries). On this page was the note re the death of Sarah M. Hoppough. Whoever pasted this note in wrote "1900" next to it. We do not have a Month. Believe the "ULT" in this case would mean the 27th day of the preceding month. I have seen them use "ULT" like they have here to mean "preceding".

Of the 13 kids of Peter Hoppough, Westbrook was the oldest and the one we do not have much on re heirs. Our curiosity peaked because we now have two "Sarah's daughter of Westbrook".

An 1840 census shows him with: 1 female (b) 1820-1825**; 1 Female (b) 1825-1830; 1 male (b) 1830-1835 and 1 male (b) 1835-1840. (**He did not get married to Lydia Decker until 1829 so we figured first one to be live in help or relative. Now however this could be "second marriage".

In 1850 no mention is made of the first female. Balance is Sarah M. 20 years old (b) N.J.; Halsey 18 yrs (b) N.J. and William 13 yrs (b) N.Y.

In the Canadice Cemetery on the lot with Westbrook and Lydia is a grave of the Sarah Ross "daughter of Westbrook" who died 10-19-1873, age 38 years 10 months, making her date of birth 1835 which agrees with nothing!

The Sarah from Angelica (d) 1900 age 70 so birth would be 1830, which does agree with 1850 census! An obituary might name her survivors, hopefully. I know early census takers were not too accurate with dates.

I will write the Historian in Canadaigua, N.Y to see if I can get a Marriage certificate for Sarah M, or a death certificate for Sarah Ross. Before we had this small note we did not know what happened to any of the kids of Westbrook. If I can get to a larger library I can view some N.Y. census for late 1800's - early 1900's and see what Halsey had for kids. Maybe I can find William in Missouri also! Your map re where counties and towns are will sure help, it is hard to read boundry lines on current maps.

Thanks a lot for all your information.



I have started looking into a few things on Seth Marvin. I came across his name several times in a book entitled, "Allegany County and its People," and another book entitled, "History of Allegany County." I have no concrete proof, yet, if the Seth Marvin mentioned is indeed your great-great grandfather, but he was the only Seth Marvin listed in the record book for that time period. On February 14, I have an appointment to research land documents and transactions at the county courthouse. This should clarify the Seth Marvin mentioned within the text books.

To at least get you started, I have copied the text from the above books and enclosed it. I will try to obtain xerox copies the next time I am at the library. I must say, it seems Seth Marvin was a busy man, traveling and moving quite a bit. It also seems like he was a savvy business man and a prominent figure in Angelica.

Enjoy the information, I will keep you updated as to what I find out in the next few weeks.







The Almond Twentieth Century Club Library has been a part of our lives for nearly a century. It was <u>not</u> a Carnegie Library but was built and been supported and administered all these years by the women of the Almond area. Only recently have men been allowed and urged to join (equal rights!). However, we know the men have always been behind the women who served to make our library a growing and vital asset to the community.

In January the Board of Trustees distributed a letter to announce the hours and to acquaint us with the amounts of fines for overdue books after February 15, with an amnesty until then. Do you recall when the fine was 1¢ per day or 3¢ per week for the three days the library was open? Now it is 10¢ per day or 30¢ per week which seems more than reasonable considering the cost of books and

everything else today.

Remember, too, when the library had only books? Now there are video tapes, records, books on tape, large print books, puzzles, interlibrary loans and more. Eloise Baker gave a postcard picture of a Whitney Valley picnic held in the Almond Park in the early 1900s. We hope someone will be able to identify some of the folks in the picture.

We had written about living in the Jerry and Jenny Marvin home when I was a teenager. I'll share the response from her, Beulah Harris Henry, which affords a glimpse of people and life in Almond many years ago:

My Mother, Jennie Riley Harris and my Aunt, Sadie Riley Karr (Mrs. I. D.) grew up with Jennie Gibson [Marvin] and I have known her all my life until she

died a few years ago.

I remember my mother and I would visit the Gibsons who lived on the north side of the Kinney Swamp and Jennie would ride home with us and stay a week; maybe her brother, James, would visit us and take her home or we would drive back to her home on our way to visit my Grandmother and Grandfather Riley, who lived near Birdsall, NY. These were horse and buggy days. I even remember visiting the Gibsons (who were excellent farmers) and visiting school one day with Grace, Jennie's younger sister. The Teacher gave me a piece of chalk so I could write on the blackboard. Then Jennie and Jerry married. They lived on Main Street during the time the 3 boys were born--John, Paul and Maxwell.

When I visited my aunt every summer I always spent a day with Jennie. She let me help bathe the babies and rock them, etc. Then that house burned down

and I think the Fritz house was built there.

We've had several gifts of papers and pictures over the summer:

Harriet (Ide) Jay gave us information from her family:

A water bill, receipted Oct. 14, 1935 and noted this was the first home in the village to connect up with the new water system.

A pad of sales slips from the Park Garage, John Washburn, Prop., from the 1920s. The garage was located just south of the park on Main Street which is now Flint's Auto Service. Note the phone number 29-F-11. That translates to one long and one short ring. The first two numbers (29) are the number of the party line. a long ring followed by the opposite (a short one). Dorothy (Bowen) Bayless reminds us that a phone number with a "Y" instead of an "F" meant the first ring(s) would be short.

Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Mullikin gave some old newspapers found in the walls of a home.
