CHAP. XV.

An ACT to divide the town of Leicester, in the county of Genesee.

DE it enacted by the people of the state of 1) New-York, represented in senate and assembly, That from and after the passing Angelica erect of this act, all that part of the town of of Leicester. Leicester lying south of a line beginning on the eastern transit line at the thirtyfour mile stone, thence running due east twelve miles to the west line of the county of Steuben; thence south, in the east line of the county of Genesee, thirty-four miles to the north line of the state of Pennsylvania; thence west, twelve miles on the said north line of the state of Pennsylvania, to the eastern transit line; thence north, on said eastern transit line, thirtyfour miles, to the place of beginning, shall be and hereby is erected into a separate town by the name of Angelica; and the first town meeting in said town of Angelica shall be held at the dwelling-house of A.D. 1805. Joseph Taylor, in said town; and all the remaining part of the said town of Leicester shall be and remain a separate town, by the name of Leicester; and the next annual town-meeting in said town of Lei-

cester shall be held at the dwelling-house of Leonard Stimson, in said town. And be it further enacted, That the said

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LAWS OF NEW YORK

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In the name of the Most Holy and Undivided Trinity.

It having pleased the Divine Providence to dispose the hearts of the most serene and most potent Prince George the Third, by the Grace of God King of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, Duke of Brunswick and Lundeberg, Arch-Treasurer and Prince Elector of the Holy Roman Empire, &c., and of the united States of America, to forget all past misunderstandings and differences that have unhappily interrupted the good correspondence and friendship which they mutually wish to restore; and to establish such a beneficial and satisfactory intercourse between the two countries, upon the ground of reciprocal advantages and mutual convenience, as may promote and secure to both perpetual peace and harmony: And having for this desirable end already laid the foundation of peace and reconciliation, by the provisional articles, signed at Paris, on the 30th of November 1782 by the commissioners empowered on each part, which articles were agreed to be inserted in and to constitute the treaty of peace proposed to be concluded between the Crown of Great Britain and the said united States of America, but which treaty was not to be concluded until terms of peace should be agreed upon between Great Britain and France, and His Britannic Majesty should be ready to conclude such tracty accordingly; and the treaty between Great Britain and France having since been concluded His Britannic Majesty and the United States of America, in order to carry into full effect the provisional articles above mentioned, according to the tenor thereof, have constituted and appointed, that is to say, His Britannic Majesty on his part, David Hartley, esq., member of the Parliament of Great Britain; and the United States on their part, John Adams, esq., late a commissioner of the United States of America at the Court of Versailles, late delegate in Congress from the State of Massachusetts, and chief justice of the said State, and Minister Plenipotentiary of the said United States to their High Mightinessesthe States General of the United Netherlands; Benjamin Franklin, Esq're, late Delegate in Congress from the State of Pennsylvania, president of the convention of the said State, and Minister Plenipotentiary from the United States of America at the Court of Versailles; John Jay, esq're, late president of Congress, and chief justice of the State of New York, and Minister Plenipotentiary from the said United States at the Court of Madrid, to be the Plenipotentiaries for the concluding and signing the present definitive treaty: who, after having reciprocally communicated their respective full powers, have agreed upon and confirmed the following articles:

ARTICLE I

His Britannic Majesty acknowledges the said United States, viz. New Hampshire, Massachusetts Bay, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia, to be free, sovereign and independent States; that he treats with them as such, and for himself, his heirs and successors, relinquishes all claims to the Government, proprietory and territorial rights of the same, and every part thereof.

ARTICLE II

And that all disputes which might arise in future, on the subject of the boundaries of the said United States may be prevented, it is hereby agreed and declared that the following are, and shall be, their boundaries, viz: - - - - - - - -






LAND HOLDINGS IN WESTERN NEW YORK - 1800






MASSACHUSETTS PREEMPTION LANDS OF WESTERN NEW YORK

Land in the southern part of the Morris Reserve was divided into townships six miles square for Morris in 1798. Since the Reserve was 12 miles wide it contained two ranges of townships. Township 1 of Range 2 was in the southwest corner of the Reserve, on the Pennsylvania line. The 100,000 acre Church Tract was in townships 2, 3, 4, 5 & 6 of the second range, immediately east of the Transit Meridian Line, which separated the Morris Reserve from Holland Company lands.




THE MASSACHUSETTS PREEMPTION LANDS OF WESTERN NEW YORK STATE



The Preemption Line divided the land between the state of New York and the commonwealth of Massachusetts as and when the Indian title was extinguished. Title to land west of the Preemption Line was to go to Massachusetts, agreed upon by New York and Massachusetts at Hartford in 1786.

The Seneca Nation gave up title in 1788 only to land east of the confluence of Genesee River and Canaseraga Creek. The line from this point directly south to the Pennsylvania boundary was called the Indian Line. Land between the Preemption and the Indian lines was sold by Massachusetts to Oliver Phelps and Nathaniel Gorham. A twelve mile wide strip of land west of the Genesee River was also given up by the Seneca as payment for a sawmill for the Indians at what is now Rochester.


From Indian Line westward, except for the above Millyard Tract, the Seneca sold all of western New York to Robert Morris, who had bought Massachusetts' preemption rights. Within this area a further exception was the land promised to the Indians for reservations. September 1797.



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





The grid system of land survey set out in the Northwest Ordinance 1785 was adopted by Robert Morris for the part of his western New York land holdings that he intended to reserve for future sale (Morris Reserve). The system was applied to the original town of Angelica area. This included the subdivision of each six mile square township into 36 sections or lots, each containing 640 acres.

Feb 18 1792 Robert Morris sold 100,000 acres of land in his Tract No. 1 (Morris Reserve) to Watson, Craigie & Co. Starting at the south shore of Lake Ontario, the tract was to be 480 chains wide and 2100.34 chains long. It was believed to lie entirely east of the course of an eastern transit meridian line to be run after the Indian title was extinguished. The line was to separate Morris Reserve from the land Morris had sold to Holland Land Company. Though the Watson, Craigie & Co. tract had not been surveyed, other tracts sold or mortgaged before the line was run were described as depending from this first 100,000 acre tract. When the transit line was started at the New York-Pennsylvania boundary twelve miles west of the southwest corner of Phelps and Gorham Purchase and run north to Lake Ontario it was found to run through all of the tracts rather than along their western boundaries. Since the sale to Watson, Craigie & Co. was made before the sale to Holland Land Company, the transit meridian line was jogged 166.31 chains to the west so that it would bound this tract rather than split it. The tract immediately south of Watson, Craigie & Co. was reduced in width and the other three tracts moved to the east so as not to overlap the Holland Company land. The most southerly of these tracts had been mortgaged to Alexander Hamilton to secure a debt owed by Morris to John Barker Church, Hamilton's brother-in-law. This contained 100,000 acres and was conveyed by Thomas L. Ogden to Church after Ogden, at the request of all Morris's creditors, had bid in all of Morris's land holdings at sheriff's sale May 13 1800. Church's son Philip explored the tract in 1801, designated a site for a village to be named for his mother, Angelica Schuyler Church. Settlement was started 1802 by Evert VanWickle, named by Church as agent.




The sixmile square townships and the milesquare sections were laid down by Adam Hoops for Robert Morris after 1797 and before 1801 when John Barker Church got title.

In the advertisement of the Church lands "A Town called Angelica" means township 4 range 2 Morris Reserve. The "four lots in the middle of it" are sections 15, 16, 21 and 22 of township 4 range 2.

In 1785 the Continental Congress passed a land ordinance for the Northwest Territory, an area which later became the states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin. The ordinance laid out the method to be followed in the division and subdivision of land after title had been obtained from the native Indians. Two cardinal lines were to be used. The first was an east-west parallel of north latitude; the other a north-south meridian. By means of these lines the land was to be divided into townships, each six miles square. Each township was to be subdivided into thirty six sections, each section containing 640 acres of land. Robert Morris and other land speculators in western New York adopted this system. On the page opposite the base line is the 42nd parallel of north latitude, i.e. the New York-Pennsylvania boundary. The meridian is the eastern transit meridian line of the Holland Land Company. On the map Township 1, Range 2, Morris Reserve is the present town of Alma. Since April 15 1833 the area within Township 4, Range 2, Morris Reserve has been that of the town of Angelica. The southern part of the Morris Reserve had been divided into townships and each township subdivided into sections by 1800. The township and section corner markers are remarked in the earliest survey notes of John B. Church's surveyor, Major Moses VanCampen. starting November 16 1802. In the middle of each township, the four central sections were numbered 15, 16, 21, 22. At present the four central sections (great lots) are numbered 28, 29, 36, 37 because of the resurvey 1810-1811 by VanCampen at the behest of Philip Church. This survey subdivided each township into 64 sections, each containing 360 acres. On the map the area of the Church Tract is highlighted in yellow. Title to this 100,000 acres passed to John Barker Church from Thomas L. Ogden April 28 1801 as recorded by Peter B. Porter in Ontario County Liber of Deeds 9 at page 247.

The town comprised the first five townships of the first range of townships in Robert Morris Reserve and the first five townships of the second range, of which township four, after several boundary changes, became the Town of Angelica. The 10 townships contained 230,400 acres. This continued until 1816 when the town of Alfred was enlarged and the town of Angelica reduced to 184,320 acres by the passage of Laws of New York, Chapter CXVIII of the 39th session of the legislature.






PRESENT MAP of Allegany County is used to show perspective in conjunction with the town of Angelica


